Course Spotlight:





Abnormal Psychology (PSYC 421)

This course examines the major diagnostic categories and specific psychological disorders affecting humankind, with an emphasis on etiology, epidemiological factors, prevalence, symptomatology, maintaining factors, core psychological process, and cutting edge empirically supported treatments. Students also develop initial skills in accurate diagnostic formulations using the *DSM-5*. Further attention is given to differential diagnosis and comorbidity among disorders, and gender/cultural variants.

*Where did you go to graduate school?

I graduated from La Salle University with a Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.) degree in Clinical Psychology. La Salle's Psy.D. program equally emphasized the development of expertise in both the research and practice of clinical psychology, and stressed the utilization of evidence-based research to guide clinical decision-making.

*Which psychology courses do you teach?

I currently teach Abnormal Psychology, Health Psychology, and Roots: Psychology. During my time at MC, I have also taught Psychological Testing, Contemporary Psychotherapies, Behavior Modification, and Personality Theories.

*Which undergraduate course did you find most influential, and why?

I was probably most affected by a Stress Management course. The professor told so many stories to illustrate the various constructs, and discussed real client examples that brought the material to life. I have always tried to integrate stories and client cases into my teaching, thanks to her excellent instruction!

Faculty Focus



*What is the focus of your research?

My research activities are diverse. One arm of my research program focuses on investigating various areas of clinical sport and performance psychology, particularly theory development of performance dysfunction; evaluation of the empirical support for sport-performance psychology interventions; classification of performers' psychological and performance issues; mindfulness; mechanisms of action; emotion regulation; and performance enhancement. My second research focus is on investigating numerous psychological variables related to anger and aggression/violence, with a particular focus on anger dyscontrol and the associated intrapersonal and interpersonal consequences. My third research area focuses on various constructs related to mindfulness, emotion regulation, and experiential avoidance, and their relationship to positive/negative emotional states and adaptive/maladaptive functioning.


*What do you do when you're not teaching or doing research?

A Few Curriculum Changes to Know!

The Psychology Department has made a few important revisions to the curriculum. Please keep these in mind when planning future coursework in your major or minor...

- ❖ We completely dropped **PSYC 209: Introduction to Psychology 2** from the curriculum. If you have not taken PSYC 209, you will no longer take it. To replace those 3 credits, you can take a PSYC elective of your choice. If you have already taken PSYC 209, this does not apply to you.
- ❖ We have reorganized our statistics and research methods courses a bit. Faculty determined that since statistics and research methods are so integrally linked, we will now integrate the two courses, and provide both an introductory and advanced course prior to the Senior Capstone: Advanced Research Methods course. So...
 - o The old PSYC 205: Statistics course is now **PSYC 214: Statistics** and **Research Methods I**. If you have not yet taken the old PSYC 205, you will now take PSYC 214 instead. If you have already taken the old PSYC 205, you will take PSYC 314 as the next course in the sequence (see next point).
 - The old PSYC 315: Research Methods I course is now PSYC 314: Statistics and Research Methods 2. If you have not yet taken the old PSYC 315, you will now take PSYC 314 instead. If you have already taken the old PSYC 315, you are ready to take PSYC 414: Senior Capstone: Advanced Research Methods (see next point).
 - We have renumbered the old PSYC 322: Senior Capstone: Advanced Research Methods course. It is the same course, but it is now numbered PSYC 414. So, now look for **PSYC 414: Senior Capstone: Advanced Research Methods** when it's time to register for this course. You will still take this course in your senior year (only!), and after PSYC 214 and 314 have been successfully completed.

Jessica Esposito has been awarded this year's Broderick Medal for Psychology!


